2023 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements • County Fairs

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.
2. All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.
3. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI’s shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request.
CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal’s owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
4. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.
5. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
6. CVI for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
7. CVI for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
8. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner’s risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner’s premise.
Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
9. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. New examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.
The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
10. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.
Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.
11. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

CATTLE

- Identification**
Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, official metal ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable), or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.
- Illinois Cattle**
- Brucellosis**
Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.
- Tuberculosis**
Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.
- Please note:** Illinois calves under 6 months of age, and Illinois

- steers are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- Out-of-State-Cattle**
- Permit**
1. All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit.
 2. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.
- Brucellosis**
1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
 - C. Animal originated from a “Class Free” state (if entire state is so classified)
 - D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
 2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.
- Tuberculosis**
1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
 - A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
 - C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.
- SWINE**
- Illinois Swine**
- Identification**
1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
 2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine. (Note: Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for brucellosis and pseudorabies testing.)
- Brucellosis**
Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.
- Pseudorabies**
All exhibition swine are required to be tested for pseudorabies as described below.
1. Swine of all ages shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition; or swine shall originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
 2. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.
- Additional Requirements**
1. Swine consigned to terminal market classes must meet the same test requirements as exhibition swine if these classes are held in conjunction with “exhibits not intended for slaughter”.
 2. When terminal classes are held on a day when no other livestock are present, these animals are exempt from all test requirements and do not need a CVI. All swine terminal classes must be identified by a site tattoo prior to movement to slaughter.
 3. Swine from pseudorabies-quarantined herds are not allowed to exhibit regardless of whether or not the show is terminal or non-terminal.
 4. The Illinois and DuQuoin State Fairs are not classified as terminal shows.
- Out-of-State Swine**
- Permit**
1. All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit.
 2. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.
- Identification**

1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
 2. Ear notch identification is not acceptable for crossbred animals.
- Brucellosis**
1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate immediately and directly from a brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
 2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.
- Pseudorabies**
All exhibition swine are required to be tested for pseudorabies as described below.
1. Swine shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the past thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
 2. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.
 3. The Illinois and DuQuoin State Fairs are not classified as terminal shows.
- SHEEP**
- Identification**
Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.
When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.
- Market Lambs**
All wethers must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.
- Illinois Sheep**
1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.
- Out-of-State Sheep**
1. All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.
 2. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
 3. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.
- HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE**
- Illinois Equine**
1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
 4. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.
- Out-of-State Equine**
1. All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.
 2. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
 3. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
 4. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.

- RULES
1. All cattle must be in place by 9:00 p.m. Thursday, July 20.
 2. All cattle exhibited must comply with health requirements set up by the Illinois Department of Agriculture as explained on Page 3.
 3. Stalls will be marked off on Monday, July 17. Any exhibitor wanting certain stalls should contact the Superintendent prior to that time. We will make every effort to accommodate you.
 4. Open Beef Breeding Cattle will be shown on Saturday, July 22 starting at 8:00 a.m. Show order will be % Simmental, Simmental, Hereford and Polled Hereford, Angus, Shorthorns, All other Breeds.
 5. Cattle in "All Other Breeds" must meet minimum requirements for registration in their respective breeds and/or be "at least 1/2 blood".
 6. Exhibitors must provide pedigrees to the Superintendents. Exhibitors must have registration papers or proof of application.
 7. Showing will commence with the youngest heifer class.
 8. The Superintendents reserve the right to eliminate a breed show if that breed doesn't have 15 head entered and two exhibitors. That breed will be included in "All Other Breeds."
 9. All open breeding stock must have a valid health certificate or be checked by a State Approved Veterinarian before exhibition.
 10. All cattle will be released Saturday, July 22 after the show.
 11. No exhibitor will be allowed to win more than two premiums in any one class.
 12. Each exhibitor must give name, address and social security number.
 13. Please bring birthdates of open breeding stock with you when making entries.
 14. Please pick up checks at office prior to leaving on Saturday.

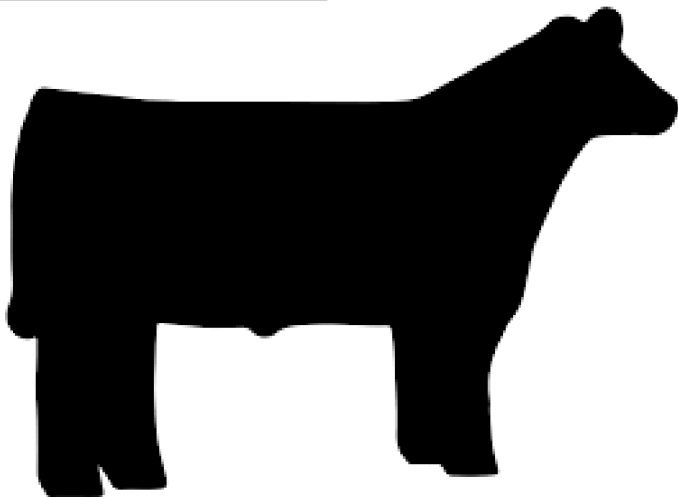
- RULES

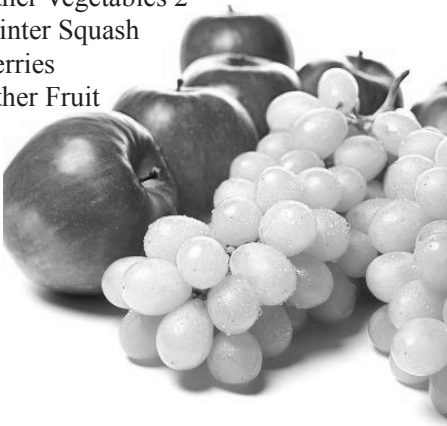

Suggestions for making arrangements: a) cut plants no earlier than the day before showing, preferable after sundown; b) cut steams at an angle with a sharp knife and place in water immediately; c) store in cool place; d) use a good holder well-anchored in the base, e.g. needle point holders are good all-purpose holders.

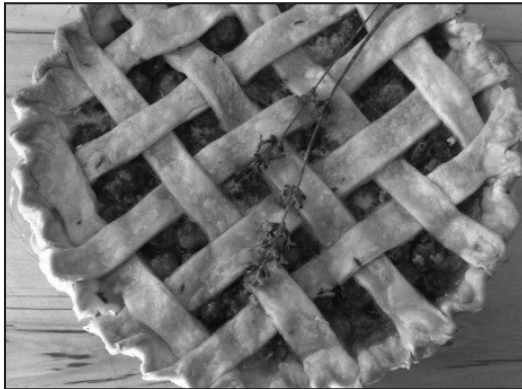

- 1. Board Members have final decision.
- 2. Judges decision is final on the track.
- 3. A certified weight and point system will be in effect. No vehicle will be awarded points unless membership dues and insurance fees are paid. (points will begin at this time)
- 4. Membership dues are \$40.00 per year and insurance fees are \$160.00 per vehicle. At the first event, before hooking membership dues and insurance fee are required to be paid in full. Pullers will be allowed to compete for a one day membership fee of \$20.00 per event per vehicle with a maximum of 5 events and NO points will be awarded.
- 5. Any changes made will require a re-certification. To re-certify two tractors will be used to set the scale.
- 6. All tracks for pulling contest should be a minimum of 200 feet and maximum of 320 feet where allowed. There should be an area at the end for shut down which is kept open at all times.
- 7. All hooks are to start with a tight hitch. NO jerking is allowed.
- 8. In each class the puller Number One will be the test puller. The test puller may take the hook if the sled is set. If the puller does not take the first hook they may immediately take a second hook or they can hook third or last.
- 9. All pullers will have two chances to start the sled within a 100 foot pit area. In the event of a pull off there will be only one attempt to complete the pass. The pull will terminate when forward motion ends. In the event of a pull off the pullers must hook or they will be disqualified. In the event the puller pulling vehicle has broken to where another hook will cause more damage it will be listed last in the pull off.
- 10. Any part of the vehicle or sled (excluding flaps) goes out of bounds or touches the white line the driver is DQ. The judge will have the final decision.
- 11. No one allowed on track except track judge, puller and or track official. No support vehicles or coaches are allowed after the vehicle is hook to the sled.
- 12. Any trial runs will be made after the completion of the entire class with the IFPA board, sled operator and promoters permission.
- 13. All pulling vehicles will be subject to inspection by the IFPA directors or tech committee before and after each pull. Vehicles that do not meet IFPA rules will be subject to disqualification.
- 14. The board has the right to internally inspect any new entry or certification of any class at any time.
- 15. Any protest must be made before pulling vehicle leaves the track.
- 16. Tech committee or IFPA board will have the power to enforce the rules and settle disputes over disqualifications. Any repeat infractions will result in a one year disqualification from the time of the infraction.
- 17. Pullers must remain seated and remain in an upright position and KEEP ONE HAND ON THE STEERING WHEEL at all times. Vehicle must be operated in a safe manner on and off the track. No passengers are allowed on the vehicle. Pulling vehicles must be attended and drivers must be in seat at all times while engine is running.
- 18. Any vehicle operated in an unsafe manner or any unsportsman like conduct, including foul language or excessive use of alcohol will be grounds for disqualification and loss of event points. No alcohol will be allowed on the track.
- 19. Driver will place the pulling vehicle in NEUTRAL and have foot off the clutch while hooking or unhooking from the sled.
- 20. All weights shall be secured to the pulling vehicle. Any weight lost during a measured hook will result in an disqualification. No weights allowed on platform, seat or in the cab. Weights shall not interfere with hooking of the sled.
- 21. Excessive loss of liquid from the vehicle will be a cause for termination of the pull by the track judge and the distance will be measured at that point.
- 22. A vehicle may not be entered in the same class more than once and is limited to 3 classes per event.
- 23. All tractors must have hood and fenders if equipped from the factory and must be as close to the original as possible.
- 24. All vehicles must have working brakes.
- 25. All tractors must have factory equipped governors and must be operative.
- 26. All forms of nitro-methane (including nitrous oxide and propylene) are illegal as fuel. NO LP; ice, water alcohol, or pressurized tanks of any kind allowed. LP will be allowed as a primary fuel. Alcohol is allowed in IFPA trucks and 8,500 open class.
- 27. No front wheel assist tractors, steel wheels, dual tires and chains.
- 28. All tractors must have tip over bars. Tip over bars must extend a minimum of 32 inches behind the center of the rear axle and be a minimum of 20 inches apart. Pads must be a minimum of 5 inches square and must not be more than 10 inches off the ground. Tip over bars must be able to support the tractor when a jack is placed under them and are subject to IFPA approval.
- 29. Kill switches and air shut off’s for diesel powered vehicles will be required for all IFPA entries.
- 30. Anyone protesting the legality of a pulling vehicle engine will be required to put a \$250.00 tear down fee. If the vehicle is found to be in violation the protester will retain the \$250.00 and the violation vehicle and the member will be disqualified for one year. If the vehicle is found to be legal the protestee will receive the \$250.00.
- 31. All rules will be strictly enforced. Any question on the legality of a vehicle, PLEASE contact a tech or board member to resolve any issues.
- 32. IFPA is hiring a track official to flag at some pulls. Track judge will need to be IFPA Member.
- 33. Electric fans are required on all pulling vehicle.
- 34. NO inter-coolers, after-coolers or cooling devices for the air or fuel of any kind are not allowed.
- 35. All tractors must have a functioning RPM monitoring device approved by IFPA. All tractors must have a two prong 120v tach plug. (Gordyville Style)
- 36. Side shields are required for Pro Farm.
- 37. All vehicles must be equipped with balancer retainer.
- 38. All gas engines must have electric fuel pump shut off.
- 39. REQUIRED: Seat belts for all pulling vehicles.
- 40. All vehicles hooking eye must measure 3 1/2 inches deep and 3 inches wide.
- 41. REQUIRED: All classes will wear Fire Suit and Helmet. Farm Stock Class refer to Rule 30 in Farm Stock Rules.
- 42. No out of bounds after 300 feet.
- 43. If puller or pullers goes out of bounds they will receive last place points.
- 44. Flag Man will cross the flags if the puller goes out of bounds and will throw red flag if it is a safety issue.
- 45. Rules are locked in for 2 years unless a change is requested. The requested change will then go the Board and Board will vote on the requested changed.

Drivers may maneuver in any direction hitting other active cars once every minute or less. Drivers’ door hits are not allowed. You get one warning and then are disqualified. Two fires and you will be disqualified. Helmet, long sleeves, and adequate eye protection MUST be worn. At least a lap-type seat belt must be worn. NO ALCOHOL OR DRUGS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE PIT AREA. VIOLATORS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED

1. ALL RULES WILL BE FOLLOWED OR YOU WILL NOT RUN. JUDGES DECISIONS ARE FINAL!!

2. Any American made car can run with the following exceptions: Full-Size cars must have a wheelbase of at least 113” or more. 4x4’s, ambulances, hearses, trucks or limousines. No manipulating a wagon’s roof to create a sedan on a fresh car. No 1970 or older Lincolns, no 1973 or older Chrysler Imperials or Imperial Sub-Frames.

3. All drivers must sign driver’s paperwork before being inspected or they will not run the event.

4. Drivers must wear a seat belt, helmet & fire suit jacket.

5. All drivers must attend the pit meeting before each event. Driver’s meeting are always approx. 30 minutes before the event showtime.

6. No drivers are allowed any alcohol or drugs before their event. If found drinking alcohol or under the influence while wearing a driver’s band you will be disqualified for the remainder of the event.

7. If it is not in the rules and doesn’t tell you, you can do it, then don’t! We can’t stress that enough!! Please contact our facebook page and message us if your not sure.

8. DO NOT paint anywhere on suspension, frame or interior of car. If done, we will not even inspect your car.

Show Rules:

1. You have 1 minute to make an aggressive hit. After 1 minute that car is disqualified. That is 1minute total. An aggressive hit is solely at the discretion of the officials.

2. For safety, DO NOT HIT THE DRIVERS DOOR!!

3. You are given 2 fires- 1st one we put out and the 2nd one you are done for that round.

4. Rollovers- you may keep going as long as car is deemed safe.

5. Watch the officials. If they are trying to get your attention, there is a reason.

6. No holding or pinning, you must back up and show day light. You may not pin to win!

THIS IS A SET OF GUIDELINES OF HOW TO BUILD YOUR CAR. IF IT DOESN’T SAY YOU CAN SPECIFICALLY DO SOMETHING THEN YOU CAN’T!!!

Car Preparation:

1. No Fresh Paint or Undercoating on the frames at all. No buffing or grinding frames or bodies except where welding is specifically allowed in these rules. No painting in the interior of the car.

2. All cars must be stock, unless modification is stated in the rules.

3. All glass, plastic, chrome, and interior must be removed from car before arriving to the derby.

4. All trailer hitches and braces must be removed.

5. Batteries must be moved to passenger front floorboard. They must be properly secured and covered.

6. You must have a number in bright colors on each front door and must have at least the size of a 15”x15” sign on the roof of your car with car number on it for judging and recognition of the car. You cannot use the roof sign to strengthen the car.

7. All cars must have working brakes when you cross the ramp. If the car is not able to exhibit the ability to stop it will not be inspected.

8. NO welding other than what is mentioned in this set of rules. If your car is found with any weld, other than what is allowed, and you refuse to fix it to the judge’s satisfaction, you and your car will not run!!

BODY:

1. Remove all glass mirrors and plastic. Remove all decking in wagons Vehicles must be swept clean of all debris

2. No sedagons, ZERO crease enhancement, ZERO sheet metal or frame shaping, forming or folding

. 3. Deck and Hood must be 100% in stock location and open for inspection. After inspection you may tuck trunk with a single 90-degree bend.

4. Anything can be removed; NOTHING can be added!!!!

5. Fasten trunks, hoods, tail gates in 4 places, 2 strands of #9 wire or 3/8 bolts with factroy washers to sheet metal only. 4 spots of 2x2 angle 2inches long with 3/8 bolts may be used on the hood instead of as well. You may weld doors 12 inches total on each vertical seam only2”x1/8” Strap. Do not weld hood or trunk!

6. Body mounts and spacers to remain stock and in place. If they are broken or rusted out, a single piece #9 wire may be substituted. No body bolt changing allowed. DO NOT EVEN TOUCH THEM Exception:

Drive Train: ANY drivetrain allowed with the following criteria. 1. Only the lower stock engine mounts may be welded to cradle only. You may use two 1/2” thick spacers to raise engine to clear steering components, may not exceed rubber mount area. You may extend off back of cradle but nothing excessive, 1/2” flat plate only (example SBC in Caddy, Mopar) 2. No tranny protectors, stock mounting only, stock crossmembers only. No welding

3. Rear End Swaps Allowed: NO bracing. You may use a factory 9 inch or 8 ¾ with factory lower brackets off of a coil spring rear end and weld on uppers with a rubber mount. Call Austin or Kenny on how to mount it. Must be factory axels. Max axle size 31 spline. NO fabricating or welding allowed of axles or rear end (inside or outside). You may weld rear end gears only.

4. You may run 1 piece of 3/8” standard chain from rear end around the frame OR 2 strands of #9 from rear end to frame, nothing thru body (# 9 wire can have 2 loops, 4 strands together in center twist only.) One or the other, can’t do both.

5. Aftermarket Cable Shifters, Gas Pedals, Steering Columns & Headers are allowed. Clarification: None may strengthen car.

6. Lower engine cradles only. No pulley protectors, skid plates, protectors of any kind, no aftermarket parts of this nature at all.

7. You may swap engines, example: Chevy in a Ford.

8. Slider drive shafts are allowed.

Driver Compartment

1. 4-point square cage only with one 2x3 down tube to sheet metal only per side. max 60-inch side bars 6inch max. Halo bar allowed to back seat bar or floor sheet metal. Gas tank must be mounted horizontally and 8 inches off floor. No Gas Tank Protector.

2. Drivers door must be padded.

3. Gas tank and battery must be moved and secured. Tank behind the seat, Battery centered in the passenger front floor.

4. Nothing may be mounted in a way that strengthens the car.

5. Trans coolers allowed. Must be mounted inside 4-point cage area.

Bumpers

1. You may weld on any loaded (loaded on inside only, nothing on the outside) factory OEM bumper, or a simple piece of 4x6 or smaller tubing. you may weld the stock bumper bracket for the car or the bumper to frame 4 inches from the back of bumper, single pass only. •In addition, you may put 4 one-inch welds on back side of bracket or to weld shock inside frame (example Crown Vics). All bumper material longer than 4” back must be removed.

2. Shocks may be collapsed and welded. All shocks and brackets in stock location only and extended one inch in front of frame.

•ALL bumper brackets and shocks must be in stock location. Or

•You may shorten to one inch in front of the core support space and hard nose with no shocks or brackets on car. Or

•You may chain, one piece of chain per side BOLTED from the mount to mount to hold on the bumper.

Only welding allowed is doors, bumper, engine mount, cage and rear end gears!

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


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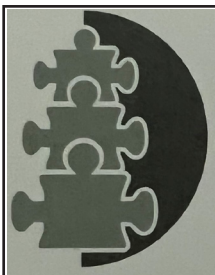

Miss, Jr., and Little Miss Contestant Rules and Regulations

It is the goal of the Hancock County Fair Board to get one or more participants in the contest from each community within the bounds of Hancock County & McDonough County geographic areas. Includes the following school districts: Carthage, Dallas City, Nauvoo-Colusa, Warsaw, Hamilton, LaHarpe, Southeastern, West Prairie, Bushnell and Macomb.

1. Any number of qualified contestants may enter from each community.
2. Contestant must be a U.S. citizen.
3. Non-Winners of the previous Hancock County Fair Pageant are eligible as long as they comply with the rules.
4. To qualify, the applicant must meet the following requirements.
 - a. Candidates must be single and never have been married, divorced, or had a marriage annulled. It must be understood also the contestants enter the pageant cannot have had a child.
 - b. A Miss candidate must be the minimum age of 16 years of age by the date of the pageant and not have reached her 22nd birthday before January 1 of the year following the pageant. The Jr. Miss must be a minimum age of 10 years by the date of the pageant and have not reached her 15th birthday by January 1 following the pageant. The Little Miss candidate must be a minimum of 5 years of age by the date of the pageant and not have reached her 9th birthday by January 1 of the year following the pageant.
 - c. No professional models will be eligible. A candidate is considered to be a professional if she has received any payment for modeling such as print, runway or any other paid professional activity, other than receiving expense money.
 - d. There is no talent presentation related to this contest and selection based on poise, personality, and beauty.
 - e. No contestant of the Hancock County Fair Queen Pageant may be entered in another county fair queen pageant during the same summer.
 - f. Contestants agree to abide by all the rules of the Miss, Jr., and Little Miss pageant now in effect and hereafter to be announced.
 - g. Any reports of misconduct or the unsportsmanlike behavior of a contestant or parent will result in immediate disqualification. Any form of alcohol or drugs will result in disqualification as well.

- h. Miss contestants must give a short speech on stage, model a swimsuit and evening gown and be interviewed by a panel of judges. Jr. Miss contestants will be interviewed by a panel of judges, short speech onstage, model a dress, and onstage question. Little Miss contestants will be judged on appearance, self confidence, personality, and speaking ability. ALL wardrobe must be approved by directors prior to the pageant.
- i. Contestants cannot currently hold a crown from another judged pageant at the time of the Hancock County Fair Queen Pageant.
5. Entry Deadline for all contestants is June 10, 2023.
6. All contestants must attend a minimum of four to five practices.

- Requirements of the Newly Crowned Miss, Jr., and Little Miss Hancock County Fair.
1. Will be required to be at all fair activities with an approved chaperone.
 2. Attend County Fair Day at the Illinois State Fair in August.
 3. Ride in all local or surrounding community parades to be approved by directors.
 4. Help with the Miss, Jr., and Little Miss pageant the following year. Attending all practices and assist with the crowning of the new Miss, Jr., and Little Miss.
 5. Attend the Central Zone Meeting held in Springfield in October. (Miss only)
 6. The Miss winner will receive an all expense paid chaperoned trip to the Illinois State Fair Queen Pageant held in Springfield in January. She will also receive a minimum of \$1,500 scholarship upon completion of her reign. She will also receive \$500 wardrobe money for state pageant. Wardrobe must be approved by directors. 1st runner up will receive \$250, 2nd runner up \$150, and Miss Congeniality \$50.
 7. If there are five or less contestants there will only be a first runner up and only a Miss Congeniality. If there are six or more contestants there will be a first and second runner up.
 8. Other activities as designated by the Pageant Directors.
 9. The newly crowned queen will also sign a contract that details all the rules and regulations regarding her reign. This will be signed and dated by the newly crowned queen, pageant directors, and fair board president.
 10. Anything lost, stolen, or damaged during the pageant practices or the pageant is not the responsibility of the Pageant Directors or the Hancock County Fair.

How the Miss Contestants are scored.
Each category carries a percentage of the total score for a possible total score of 100. Each category is judged and scored independently from all other categories: Private Interview- 4 minutes (35%)—Speech-1 minute (30%)—Stage Presence –in evening gown (20%)—Beauty of Face and Physical Condition-swimsuit (15%)
How the Jr. Miss Contestants are scored
Jr. Miss will be judged on interview, onstage speech, onstage question, stage presence, and personality.
How the Little Miss Contestants are judged
Little Miss Contestants will be judged on stage presence, onstage questions, and personality.
